Fiji NNDSS.Table I

Diarrhea : There was a sharp increase in the number of diarrheal cases reported to the Fiji NNDSS in Jan.09. The highest proportion (51%) was reported within the Nausori area . Approximately 29% of reported cases Jan & Feb are children within the I-4yr age group.

ARI: was also at a high for both months with the most number of cases (249) affecting children aged between 1-4.

Typhoid (*not in table*) : 37 suspected cases of typhoid were reported of which 25 was documented in the Northern division (Lekutu, Nabouwalu & Labasa medical areas).

Hospital Based Surveillance System (HBAS)

There were seven clinically suspected AFR cases reported through the HBAS system for the months of January and February $\ .$

MEASLES ALERT!

3 Cases have been confirmed as at 3rd March 09. Ministry of health have urged all health facilities to be vigilant for further suspected cases. Clinical case definition for measles :is any person with fever, generalized maculopapular rash lasting 3 or more days, cough or coryza or conjunctivitis or koplik spots

Further updates to previous bulletin issues:

HIV: Total number of confirmed cases at Fiji CDC in 2008 is 31. In 2009 there have been 4 cases confirmed in January . February & March figures are pending and will be released after the next meeting of the national committee on AIDs.

Dengue & Leptospirosis

The number of requests have increased, particularly in Dengue & Leptospirosis tests. Mataika Hse have recently received additional test kits and is currently processing all pending tests for January 2009. Furthermore. the use of NSI test kits enable early detection of antibodies to < 3 days with sensitivity between 77. 9% - 97.4% and specificity between 96. 0% - 99. 6% at 95% Cl.

Den-4 serotype has now been confirmed in the Northern division similar to Eastern & Western division in 2008. In addition, most samples indicated secondary infection to Den-2 in the past. Special note is to be taken due to increased susceptibility to DHF with secondary infections of a different subtype.

Influenza

Although there were no tests conducted at the main lab .PCR analysis have begun on 10 patient samples with ILI. This is part of the Flu Sentinel surveillance programme to be officially launched on the 2nd April 2009. More details & results will be included within the next quarterly Flu Newsletter due out in April
