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Results of Inform'ACTION survey

The survey was conducted from the end of October 2008 to mid-March 2009 using a questionnaire available in English and French and electronic or paper formats. Links to the English and French electronic versions were sent to PPHSN members through PacNet and the bilingual printed version was sent with the 29th edition of Inform'ACTION and with our SPC greeting cards.

Results

In total, 35 questionnaires were completed by PPHSN members. Of these, 26 were received electronically and 9 on paper. Most of the paper copies were received by regular mail from January to mid-March. This shows that the use of various methods of communication is necessary in communicating with PPHSN members, and was also reflected in the results of the survey (85% of survey participants still want to receive hard copies of Inform'ACTION in addition to the electronic version).

Time is another issue. Pacific Island health professionals are busy and we can't conduct a survey within a short period of time.

It is worth noting that 51% of those who participated in the survey are health professionals from 13 Pacific Island countries and territories (i.e. core members of the PPHSN), and the other half (49%) are from PPHSN allied members and partners (WHO, CDC, ESR, IPNC, ILM, PPTC, VIDRL, UNFPA, AusAID, Australia and New Zealand Departments of Health and others). Six French-speaking health professionals (17% of total participants) also responded to the survey. In terms of gender, 63% of participants were male and 37% were female. The network membership was therefore quite well represented by survey respondents.

The results detailed below are positive, constructive and encouraging for the future of the bulletin.
